





Even before the town of Waterloo—later renamed Austin, Texas—was established, this land was inhabited by Native Americans. From atop the hills, Comanche tribes hunted the wildlife and kept a watchful eye on the waters of the Colorado River.

Circumstances changed in 1853, when the State of Texas granted ownership of the property on San Antonio street to S. G. Haynie for just \$193.00! Yet the land remained untouched until 1874, when Mr. and Mrs. Harvey North hired architect Alfred Giles to design a French Chateau in the style of European castles. Two years after construction began in 1876, the family's fortunes faltered and their dreams of completing their home remained unfulfilled.




As the Evans family rode in their carriage, walked to go shopping, or visited their friends, they would pass the other beautiful houses on the Bremond Block.




How did Major Evans make a difference in the lives of others?

Time after time, Ira Hobart Evans proved he was a courageous man. Born in New Hampshire, he joined the Union army to lead a battalion of African American soldiers during the War Between the States. At that time, it took great courage for a white man to command black military forces.

For his distinguished bravery, Major Evans was awarded the Medal of Honor. Also, he was selected to be an officer in the honor guard that marched in President Abraham Lincoln's funeral cortege. After Robert E. Lee's surrender at Appomattox, Major Evans was sent to Texas to help with reconstruction efforts.

Not surprisingly, Evans was the founder of the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution. No doubt this veteran of the Union Army stirred conversations as he introduced his unique perspective to Texans who earlier had sided with the Confederacy.

In 1869, he won a seat in the Texas House of Representatives and in 1870 was elected Speaker of the House. At the age of 25, Evans was the youngest person ever to hold this office. However,

when Evans favored the Democrats' position (by opposing a measure to postpone the next election), his Republican counterparts voted to remove him from the Office of Speaker. Although Evans completed his term as representative, in 1871 he left political life to become the director of a railroad company.

Continuing to foster leadership and courage, Major Evans helped to secure education for the emancipated (freed) slaves in Texas. He assisted in the establishment and funding of Tillotson College—the first institution of higher learning in Austin and for too long, the only place where African Americans could pursue a college degree. Still today at Huston Tillotson University, the building named Evans Hall pays tribute to this man's courageous legacy.






What pictures do you find in the stained glass windows?




Important to notice are the metal ceilings of pressed copper. Such metal ceilings are found in most of the rooms on the main and top floors of Chateau Bellevue.

In all, there are 7 distinctive fireplaces throughout **⊥** the mansion! Why so many?


Can you find the lion's head in the coal basket

Welcome to the top floor...


From the windows, the C children watched the boats carrying passengers and cargo on the Colorado river. Today, the Evans children would be surprised to see how times have changed.

uring the turn of the 20th Century, girls wore long dresses and bonnets, while boys wore shirts, jackets, and stovepipe trousers. While the ladies chose dresses adorned with bustles, the men wore top hats and ties (called cravats).

Catch a glimpse of yourself in the mirror. Imagine yourself wearing a black wool suit with starched collar and tie-or a very long frilly dress with full petticoats.

Look what treasures can be found in the back bedroom...

To doubt you've noticed the painted tiles on the fireplace that help you think of faraway places. Imagine sitting on the rocking chair while reading Mark Twain's Tom Sawyer or Rudyard Kipling's The Jungle Book.

Word games and tongue twisters were a favorite pastime. Families might start the day with a "flowery" greeting such as:




Mother: Good morning glory. Child: How do you dew-drop?

The Evans children and friends **■** liked to play with miniature tin soldiers, teddy bears, puzzles, puppets, toy wagons, trains, and harmonicas. They also liked to play checkers, dominoes, and cards.

From oral histories—memories shared—we know the Evans children enjoyed performing plays, such as "Old King Cole Was a Merry Old Soul"and "Old Mother Hubbard Went to the Cupboard."





As you enter the family dining room...

Think about how food was prepared 100 years ago. Although ice was available there were no electric refrigerators or stoves. It took much longer to prepare the meals. However, the Evans ate well! Being invited to the Evans' home was always a special occasion.

The children enjoyed parties with games, dancing, puppet shows, and magic shows. Lemonade, ices, fresh fruit, and sweet cakes were served. We can only wish to join their parties to taste the dishes with amusing names like Floating Island Custard, White Mountain Cake, and Kiss Pudding.



Let's move to the large reception area...

This room was added in 1958 to accommodate group meetings, elegant weddings, and fabulous parties.

But think back to the early 1900's when the Evans family lived here. At that time some attitudes in society were very different from those of today. Women did not have the right to vote in government elections, hold offices in organizations, or choose a career like being a banker, lawyer, or preacher. Only men had these rights.



Excluded from politics and employment outside the home, women found an acceptable social outlet by forming groups such as The Austin Woman's Club. At first they met in homes but as more wished to participate, they needed a larger space.

The Women's Club Movement was an important key to winning equal rights for women in the United States.

Suffragette Profile

In 1916, Jane McCallum organized a huge public demonstration on the Texas Capitol grounds to alert legislators and all citizens that women deserved the right to vote. Jane McCallum and a Texas senator had the following exchange in the hallway of the Texas Capitol. 

During World War I (1914-1918), Jane McCallum also led Austin women in raising nearly \$700,000 for the war effort. Since many men were called to become soldiers in the war, women were asked to perform jobs left vacant. In jobs as mechanics, nurses, and doctors, women showed they were capable workers, which made a difference in turning public opinion in favor of women's rights. Finally, in 1920, the 19th Amendment was enacted, giving women the right to vote!

In 1927, Jane McCallum became the first female Secretary of State in Texas, serving in this position under two governors. Her lifelong civic involvement included being a proud and valued member of The Austin Woman's Club.

"The Progressive Era" (1900 - 1918) addressed economic and social reforms.

Suffrage is the term that means THE RIGHT TO VOTE. Suffragette is the name for members, whether male or female, of the suffrage movement.

Mrs. Sam Smith, the founding President of the Austin's Woman's Club, was a notable suffragette in Austin. Along with others, Mrs. Smith worked to secure a dignified place for women to gather and promote cultural education. It was Mrs. Smith who cast the deciding vote to purchase Chateau Bellevue!

Imagine yourself an important government official sitting at the grand desk (now located on the stage)... It belonged to the 25th President of the United States, President William McKinley.

President McKinley took office in 1897. He was the first president to use telephones and telegraphs. In mere minutes, President McKinley was able to contact battlefield commanders or news reporters.

Sadly, he was assassinated in 1901, while visiting an Exposition Fair in New York. His estate gave this wonderful desk to Hobart Leslie Evans, a grandson of Major Ira Evans.

What's neat about Chateau Bellevue is the many gifts and services donated to help make it a nicer place.




Can you find the portrait of Emilie Howson in the dining room?

Other good people give to our community through services, like visiting an elderly friend or picking up trash at the park. It's all about making our world a better place.
